Message from the Board

Whiskey Jack Nordic Ski Club (WJNSC) is a cross country ski club for people in Fort St. John and the Peace Region who want to get outside in the beautiful Boreal forest in the winter for fresh air, sunshine, physical activity and fun.

Cross country skiing is an affordable outdoor winter activity for all ages and abilities. WJNSC provides groomed trails, lessons and family/community events throughout the ski season.

WJNSC currently maintains 15 km of ski trails at Beatton Provincial Park, accommodating both classic and skate skiing as well as skijoring. There are also 10 km of hiking/snowshoe trails at the park that are maintained by the club in the winter months. Additionally, the club maintains 3 km of groomed tracks at the Links Golf Course in Fort St. John and board members continue to participate in planning opportunities to identify additional locations near the community to develop ski trails. The club was first established in 1982, 15 months prior to the 1984 BC Winter Games held in Fort St. John. Trails were established at Beatton Provincial Park, 20 minutes from Fort St. John, for the purposes of hosting the Nordic events for the Games and were built to trail standards of the day. Construction of 10 kms of 4 meter wide trails were the result of this early initiative.

Between 1993 and 2003 there was a hiatus in the club but in 2003 the club was resurrected and grooming and maintenance of trails resumed. WJNSC began to acquire new grooming equipment consisting of snow mobiles and specialized attachments. Following these acquisitions, the club installed a 20' sea can at Beatton Provincial Park for secure equipment storage.

Demand for facilities for skate skiing was strong by 2009, so began the planning process for trail expansion. WJNSC hired a professional trail designer, conducted considerable fundraising and by 2013, the expanded trails were complete.

Throughout the years of improvements, club membership gradually increased. The club's initiative to offer the Cross Country Canada

Skills Development Program was particularly helpful in increasing membership.

In 2017, having outgrown the sea can, WJNSC constructed a large storage building to store our increased amount of ski rental and grooming equipment, ski program materials, tables, chairs and general supplies.

A stadium area was constructed in fall 2018 and a day lodge is now being planned at Beatton Park.

WJNSC conducts fundraising to accomplish its goals through grants, membership fees, day use fees, donations and grass roots funding opportunities.

The club is a registered society with the province of BC and is a member group of Cross Country BC and Cross Country Canada and Fort St. John Sports Council, guided by an active board of directors.



Environmental Scan

The population growth in Fort St. John and surrounding area outpaced the national average according to Statistics Canada's last census conducted in 2016. During the 5 years between 2011 and 2016, the city saw its population count rise to 20,155 from 18,609, an increase of 8.3 per cent. The population, including Fort St. John, Charlie Lake, Grandhaven, Baldonnel and Taylor rose from 26,380 to 28,396, an increase of 7.2 percent. This growth outpaced the national average increase of 5% for the same period.¹

According to the 2016 census, the average age of the population of Fort St. John was 33 and the median age was 31.² This demonstrates a generally youthful population which is accompanied by a high birth rate.³ All of this bodes well for the WJNSC which supports activities to promote an active lifestyle for adults and families.

According to statistics from Cross Country BC, the sport of cross country skiing continues to exhibit healthy and steady growth in the province with about 13,000 people involved in the sport in 2000 and approximately 18,000 in 2018. ⁴ Additionally, the greatest growth in club membership province-wide is for kids around age 10 and adults, aged 40 to 60. ⁵

WJNSC serves several stakeholder groups including: WJNSC membership, skiers from the public, BC Parks, Cross Country BC, Cross Country Canada, City of Fort St. John, School District 60 students and the Peace River Regional District.

WJNSC is experiencing moderate membership growth due to recently expanded trails and an increase in programming. The club's membership expanded significantly from 2004 when there were 40 members to 130 members in 2017, a 225% increase. Over 100 members joined since the trails were expanded in 2013. Additionally, there has been growth in the number of children joining our

club since we began offering Cross Country Canada's Skills Development Program – 24 children in 2017/18 to over 40 for the upcoming 2018/19 season, a 66% increase.

The club anticipates continued growth in our membership both in terms of adults and children as it continues to improve services and infrastructure as well as put more volunteer resources into outreach and marketing.

Mission Statement

The Whiskey Jack Nordic Ski Club is dedicated to promoting cross country skiing as a lifelong activity for the area population by providing high quality trails, programs and facilities for the community of Fort St. John, BC and Peace Region. Additionally, the club provides snowshoeing and hiking trails for the enjoyment of all.

Goals, Objectives, Strategies & Measurables

WJNSC has identified a number of goals, objectives, strategies and measurables. In general, the club continues to work to build awareness of the club, increase membership, solicit volunteers and offer a wider array of programming. Construction of a stadium area has just been completed (fall 2018) and there are plans to construct a day lodge and pit toilet – hopefully in time for the 2020 BC Winter Games. The club has also identified the need for improved grooming equipment to more efficiently groom the expanded trails. Details on each of these initiatives are found in the tables below.

Note: Unless otherwise identified, all objectives, strategies and measurables apply to all years of this 5-year plan, 2018-2022.

Goal #1: Ski Club Development

WJNSC provides a variety of services to the community. It provides accessible, cross country ski trails to its members as well as snowshoe/hiking trails to the public. WJNSC would like to see continued increased use of these trail systems by the community.

Goal #3: Solicit Volunteers

Volunteers are integral to the overall success of the club. They fill the roles of the club executive, carry out the majority of trail and facility maintenance, collect user fees, coordinate events and take responsibility for a host of other functions. Historically and generally, the WJNSC has not had an adequate number of volunteers to carry out operations. Further efforts must be made to increase club volunteers.

Currently there are 7 volunteers on the WJNSC Board of Directors. This meets a minimum; however, ideally there would be 8-10 directors. Presently there are 6 coaches; however, 8-10 active and available coaches are needed. Additionally, there are 17 trained officials to run the BC Winter Games in 2020 and we need approximately 35. We have approximately 25+ other volunteers who show up for various work bees.

Operating Budget Including Budget Philosophy

WJNSC runs a modest surplus every year as operational expenses are relatively low for 2 main reasons: first, due to the type of grooming equipment used (snow mobiles vs. large grooming machines); and second, due to an absence of land taxes, rent (trails are situated in a provincial park).

The majority of WJNSC's revenue, outside of fundraising for capital projects, is derived from membership, day use fees and program fees. As a result, the club is able to contribute towards capital projects in any given year.

The WJNSC does not incur any debt. If funding goals are not realized, capital projects are deferred until funding target is reached.

Our 3-year operating plan, for 2018-2019 can be found in *Appendix A*. This includes a detailed list of funding sources and expenses.

Capital Plan and Budget

WJNSC capital plan and budget is based on an overall desire to:

- improve skier experience
- create access for skiers of all abilities
- provide opportunities for expanded programming and event hosting
- provide other outdoor experiences in addition to cross country skiing such as snowshoeing
- contribute to worker retention in the region through the establishment of a high quality outdoor recreation amenity

Past Projects

The WJNSC has been working diligently to establish the Beatton Park trails as a destination cross country ski area and to bring the trail standards and facilities in line with other cross country ski areas in BC.

Day Lodge

Benefits of Day Lodge:

- focal point for all club activities
- allow club to expand programming host summer and/or winter camps for skiers
- allow club to promote skiing among youth in the region, which in turn promotes positive relationships among youth and provides opportunities for them to develop leadership skills which they can take back to their communities
- make the Beatton trails a destination in all seasons
- help support community/regional worker retention, especially professionals
- a place to warm up during longer ski outings and on cold days
- a place to facilitate programming, e.g., lessons for children and adults
- a place for non-skiing parents to watch their children
- a place to administer events
- a place to meet other skiers/promote socializing/community building
- a place to eat, drink and extend the ski day
- offer learning opportunities for teachers and students from School District 60
- provide a venue for the main hosting hub for the Nordic events for the 2020 BC Winter Games

- Need a committed volunteer manager to oversee maintenance and rental schedule

It is anticipated that the Day Lodge will result in net revenue for the WJNSC.

As the day lodge is the most significant undertaking for the club in terms of amount of funding to be raised, considerable thought has gone into the long term benefits and costs that will result. Internal research over the past decade within the WJNSC and local ski community has shown a consistent demand for such a facility and as a result, it has been determined that the benefits far outweigh the risks.

Grooming Equipment

The WJNSC has been using sleds for grooming since 1982 when the club and trails were first established. Newer equipment in 2009 - 2011 improved the grooming experience but since the trail expansion in 2013, the sleds are no longer adequate for the task.

Benefits of new grooming equipment:

- better handle the wider trails, hills, heavy snow events and icy conditions
- compress the snow for a harder ski surface (mandatory for race conditions)
- safer and less time consuming for groomers
- less labour intensive for volunteer groomers

- able to prep the course for race events (ability to lift and set track pan when required as per race standards and general grooming practice protocol)

Considerations:

All cross country ski clubs need to invest significant capital into grooming equipment. It may be the single most expensive acquisition for many clubs and ski areas with no clear cost recovery. The main challenges of owning a large machine are increased maintenance expenses and the need to put funds aside each year to plan for eventual replacement.

The increase in maintenance expenses can be mitigated through an increase in membership fees, increase in trail use fees and expanded marketing and programming to attract more skiers to the trails.

Summary

The WJNSC exercises due diligence when embarking on major projects and does not move ahead without careful research nor until funding targets are achieved. The club consults its membership regularly and prides itself on striving to continually seek ways to improve the cross country ski experience for both visitors to and residents of the North Peace.
